

## **Tip Sheet: Using Authentic Assessment for Progress Monitoring**



This tip sheet outlines recommended authentic assessment practices that can be used to gather information for monitoring and analyzing children's progress when reviewing and/or amending the IEP. Use the practices outlined below to guide your thinking and practice.

Recommended Practice	Considerations
Ask parents, other caregivers, and teachers about changes in the activities that comprise the child's everyday experiences	Identify changes to the types of activities that make up the child's life - have there been changes in activities and routines in home, community, and classroom settings?
	Has there been a change in the child's participation since the most recent changes (e.g., new instructional strategies, attendance to a new placement)?
<b>Observe</b> the child's participation in everyday activities and routines	<ul> <li>In what new or emerging activities is the child participating:</li> <li>Play (e.g., drawing, painting, sensory play)?</li> <li>Music/movement (e.g., playing Simon Says, singing)</li> <li>Physical (swinging, climbing, running)</li> <li>Adult-child (e.g., looking at books, engaging in pretend play)</li> <li>Everyday routines (toileting, dressing, meals)</li> </ul>
Identify the context-specific child functional behavior used in everyday activities	Use observation, teacher observation, and/or parent/caregiver support
	Attend to HOW the child participates in activities and daily routines
	Consider what types of new behaviors or skills the child uses when interacting with the environment (toys, materials, people)
	Pay particular attention to new or emerging skills/abilities
Understand the behaviors that sustain child engagement in activities (strengths, interests, etc.)	Note or observe the activities and conditions under which the child stays engaged and does his or her best (e.g., what time of day, what location, what activity, etc.)
<b>Determine</b> which materials and/or adult interactional or instructional strategies promote optimal levels of competence	Observe and determine what material, people, events, and actions are a child's favorites
	Watch for new things that cause laughter, excitement, and/or engagement
